What is One Gloucestershire ICS?

From 1 July, our One Gloucestershire ICS will be a legal entity - an existing partnership that brings together NHS, social care, public health and other public, voluntary and community sector organisations.

We know that by working together we can build a healthier Gloucestershire; supporting people to live well and providing high-quality joined-up care when people need it.

We are ambitious for our county. We want to work with you and local communities to focus on areas such as:

- **Health and care services today** - supporting recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic - including reducing waiting times for appointments, treatment and operations and supporting people's mental health
- **Transforming what we do now** - making the best use of our resources, developing our workforce and making the most of new technologies to support your care
- **Making Gloucestershire a better place for the future** - improving the health, wellbeing and care of our citizens across their lifetime and reducing health inequalities.

Whilst organisations will continue to retain their individual responsibilities to provide health and care support and services in people's homes, GP surgeries, communities and hospitals, we know that we can achieve so much more together through integrated team working at county, locality and neighbourhood level.

This guide outlines the different parts that make up our ICS and signposts you to where you can find out more.

What does NHS Gloucestershire do?

NHS Gloucestershire Integrated Care Board (NHS Gloucestershire) is responsible for planning and buying services to meet the health needs of local people.

It also brings partners together to ensure the county's NHS provides the best possible care.

It works alongside our One Gloucestershire Health and Wellbeing Partnership - ensuring a joined-up approach to health and care (see below).

Working together in Districts and Neighbourhoods


