1.0 Background

Excessive abdominal skin folds may occur following weight loss in the previously obese patient and can cause significant functional difficulty. Cosmetic surgery known as an abdominoplasty (tummy tuck) or an apronectomy (mini-tummy tuck) can be used to remove the excess skin. However, as this treatment is for cosmetic and not clinical reasons, it is not available on the NHS unless the excess skin is causing you significant difficulties, such as severely restricting your ability to move around.

2.0 Policy statement

PA	This procedure can be offered to patients who have achieved a reduced weight of at least 50% and have maintained this weight loss for 12 months <u>and</u> have severe functional problems related to the excess abdominal skin including severe difficulties in daily living i.e. ambulatory restrictions.
	In addition, patients must maintain their weight loss from the point of being listed for surgery until the date of their procedure.

3.0 Patients who are not eligible for treatment under this policy

Patients who are not eligible for treatment under this policy may be considered on an individual basis where their GP or consultant believes exceptional circumstances exist that warrant deviation from the rule of this policy.

Individual cases will be reviewed at the ICB's Individual Funding Request Panel upon receipt of a completed application form from the patient's GP, Consultant or Clinician. Personal applications from patients cannot be considered.
